LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

MLL HISTORY

Though most know that Modern Languages and Literatures is among the largest departments at Kenyon college, how it came to be that way is less common knowledge. In an effort to document the history of MLL and especially to understand how the Kenyon Intensive Language Model came into being, Concetta Blechschmidt invited Professor Emeritus, Carlos (Charles) Piano to spend an afternoon in conversation. Professor Piano, who came to MLL in 1969 to teach Spanish, participated in the first KILM workshop in 1980 with John



Rassias, founder of the Dartmouth Intensive Language Model (DILM). He is also brought Latin American Studies to Kenyon (now Latino/a Studies).

Since 1969, Carlos has seen the department grow from having only French, German and Spanish to adding Italian, Russian, Japanese and Chinese. He explains how the ability to offer more diverse majors proved to be highly attractive to students. He credits the KILM program for the department's growth by saying, "All of these curricular changes were made possible, at least in part, by the creation of the intensive language program. A student who began study in a language at Kenyon at the beginning level could now advance quickly in proficiency and do work at the level of the major in the junior year. Prior to this, students who began a language at Kenyon could not accumulate enough credits in the major in four years. Where intensive language study had a decisive impact was in lesser taught languages."

The full interview with Carlos Piano will be ready to be viewed in the near future. In the meantime, other efforts are being made to preserve the history of KILM. The films of the original workshops with John Rassias have been digitized and a space is being created on the KILM website where these and other documents such as Carlos Piano's written history of his experience will be able to be accessed.
