

Kenyon is actively trying to become an even more diverse campus. Kenyon has several programs to assist in helping students from diverse racialethnic, socioeconomic, geographic, and national backgrounds adjust to and succeed in Gambier. These programs include KEEP (Kenyon Educational Enrichment Program) and REACH (Recognizing Each other's Ability to Conquer the Hill). There are a number of student run support centers for students of diverse identities and backgrounds (as well as the larger campus) including the Snowden Multicultural Center, the Unity House, and the Crozier Center for women. International students can find support and resources through the Center for Global Engagement. Kenyon has numerous

55. How is your institution dealing with the growing national issue of sexual assault? Please describe any Title IX-related programs or services that have been initiated to raise awareness of, and prevent, sexual violence.

Kenyon takes the issue of sexual assault very seriously. Kenyon recently hired a new Civil Rights Coordinator that will be in charge of all questions of Title IX compliance. A new Title IX policy is being adopted on campus with several changes to how Kenyon addresses sexual assault including a change from a hearing model to an investigator model and making tests more accessible to victims. A College counselor is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week as week; additionally there is a well established group of peer counselors, Sexual Misconduct Advisors, that maintain a hotline. There is an annual week of sexual assault awareness

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
