Doctor of Humane Letters

David Lewis Bergman, Class of 1972

You took your place in Kenyon's long line of literary apostles, David Bergman, soon after arriving in 1968. Naturally enough, you became a leading member of the "literary fraternity," Psi Upsilon, and also contributed to Hika, one of the most distinguished undergraduate journals in the country. Perhaps more important, however, you made lifelong friends among many students, including Daniel Mark Epstein '70, and faculty mentors such as Gerrit Roelofs, the passionate scholar and teacher, and Phil Church, poet and enfant terrible. Small wonder, then, that you continued your scholarly pursuits as one of the select doctoral candidates at the Johns Hopkins University, while also continuing to write powerful poems of the first order. In 1985 you published "Cracking the Code", a first book of poetry, which won the George Elliston Poetry Prize. And your career continued to flourish for decades as a professor of literature at Towson State University, as well as an editor, scholar, and critic. In editing the barrier-shattering series "Men on Men", moreover, you became one of the most influential advocates for gay rights and gay writers in the 1980s and 90s. You boldly revealed what had been patently true all along — that many of history's most celebrated authors have been gay or lesbian. You opened our eyes so we could see. As you have written: "I suspect that all teachers of American literature assign at least some of these writers because the story of American literature can't be told without acknowledging lesbian and gay writers, although it has often been told by ignoring that they were gay and lesbian and by omitting works that speak most clearly about their sexual orientation." For such brave assertions and for your many other achievements, Kenyon is proud to honor you today.

Doctor of Science

Julie Ann Cerel, Class of 1994

Julie Cerel, you are widely recognized as a national and international expert in bereavement associated with suicide, a reputation rooted in your prolific, paradigm-shifting research program as well as in your crucial public policy initiatives. None of this surprises those of us who knew you as a Kenyon undergraduate. Even then you were an imaginative, thorough, thoughtful, and tenacious researcher, even accessing voter rolls to try to secure a diverse sample. You graduated from Kenyon with high honors in psychology, the very first recognition of your research prowess. It is not surprising that you forged your own path to a clinical psychology doctorate by securing a career determining research assistantship with Julie Fristad at The Ohio State University. Here you were immersed in research concerning

suicide bereavement and depression, especially among children. You completed the clinical psychology Ph.D. program at OSU, then moved on to a post-doc in Rochester and ultimately to your current position as the Constance Wilson Professor of Mental Health at the University of Kentucky. Throughout, your commitment to understanding suicide bereavement grew despite frequent admonitions that this was not an appropriate research focus because following the conventional — and misinformed — wisdom of the time, very few people were affected by suicides. Your research revolutionized the field by delineating the true reach of suicide bereavement, thereby defining suicide as a public health Issue. Appreciation for your work has been extensive, including the University Research Professor Award at UK and the presidency of the American Association of Suicidology. Your creative and determined approach has changed lives around the world. Kenyon is proud to, again, be one of those lauding your accomplishments.

Marela Zacarías, Mexican and American artist, Your undulating sculptural forms embrace the histories and cultures of the public places in which they reside. Curving through doorways and over ledges, they burst from their mural heritage as polished polychromed folds. Made with a skeleton of metal mesh and carapace of plaster, their strength belies their fragile fabric references. In the U.S. Consulate in Monterrey, Mexico, they echo the textile patterns of your indigenous ancestors. At a women's health clinic in midtown Manhattan, they pose as a healing shawl to those who pass by. In the arrivals terminal at the Seattle-Tacoma airport, they appear as enormous floating forms that mimic the waters of Puget Sound. Smaller works fill your solo exhibitions at galleries in New York, Seattle, Detroit and Mexico City, as well as a mid-career survey this year in San Luis Obispo, California. It is not only your art that we celebrate today. We celebrate the student you were when you came to Kenyon and immediately became a leader. As manager of the fledgling Horn Gallery, you led art programming on campus. As president of Adelante, you raised awareness of Latinx cultures. You continue your commitment to Kenyon by embracing our students who intern in your studio. Lastly, we celebrate your radiating positivity that you offer as a gift to all you meet. You remind us that our lives are "vehicles for all our past influences through which we may build our future." You offer us a "reboso" for this journey, a healing shawl of your work that may keep us safe as we travel.

The award may be made on the basis of one outstanding performance or piece of work or on the sum of an individual's activities during one or several years.

The Paul Newman-Joanne Woodward Award for Best Performance

Given by Mr. Newman, Class of 1949, and his wife, for the best acting performance by a student; awarded annually to two students who, in the opinion of the judges, have given the most skillful and successful performance in an acting role during the year.

Established in 1973 in recognition of the leadership and standards set by the women of the Class of 1973 by friends of Ms. Crozier, dean of the Coordinate College for Women from 1968 to 1972; awarded to a student who has demonstrated qualities of vision, responsibility, courage, and dedication to excellence. The recipient's name is inscribed on a cup displayed in the office of the Dean of Students.

The E. Malcolm Anderson Cup

Established in 1935 by the late Mr. Anderson, Class of 1914; inscribed each year with the name of the student who, in the opinion of students and faculty members, has done the most for Kenyon during the year.
