Steven Fischman, lawyer, real estate developer, philanthropist, Kenyon trustee, and advocate for social justice, we, the Kenyon community, honor you. We celebrate, especially, that you represent the transformative power of the liberal arts, both as it shaped your multiple careers and in the generosity with which you have given to the world.

At Kenyon, not only were you an accomplished student of history, but as the Collegian reports, you led your team in intramural football in 1961.

Karen Buchwald Wright, industrialist, business leader, philanthropist, you were born and raised in Mount Vernon, where you served for two decades as president and chief executive officer of Ariel Corporation. Founded by your father in 1966, Ariel is now a global leader in manufacturing gas compressors – and Knox County's largest employer.

In 2009, you established the Ariel Foundation to help carry out your vision for, and commitment to, improving the area's quality of life by promoting the arts, education, and the health and well-being of its citizens. Your belief that charity begins at home can be seen in the vibrancy of downtown Mount Vernon, where the products of your creative generosity range from the Grand Hotel to the Woodward Opera House, to educational buildings for both Kenyon College and Mount Vernon Nazarene University, to the whimsical dog fountain on South Main Street. Your ability to imagine and reimagine spaces for families, friends, and communities to gather has been brought to bear in such diverse venues as Ariel-Foundation Park, a favorite Mount Vernon restaurant and the Wright Family Medical Pavilion.

For Kenyon, attended by two of your sons and daughters-in-law, you have served on both the Board of Trustees and the advisory board for the Center for the Study of American Democracy. Your many gifts to the College include the Wright Family Endowed Professorship in Economics, which encourages the study of diverse viewpoints in that field. We honor you today for your leadership and your philanthropy, which promise long-lasting impacts on the futures of Kenyon and all of Knox County.
