Mariana Ruth Cook, dynamic photographer and devoted Kenyon parent, your camera has with captivating alertness opened our eyes to the world. As the last living protege of the legendary Ansel Adams, iconic landscape photographer, you set out upon your own path, emphasizing portraiture in natural light with the traditional process of black-and-white images. Each of your photos is an epiphany of unseen beauty suddenly disclosed. Your career has included solo shows and contributions in numerous museums and galleries worldwide, including New York, Hong Kong, Madrid and Berlin. This year in Basel, Switzerland, a major exhibition accompanied by a book and film documentary will highlight your prolific accomplishments. Your photographs have been clear-eyed and meditative portraits of leadership, justice and courage, shown in the faces of Nelson Mandela, Archbishop Tutu, Ruth Bader Ginsburg and a young couple in Chicago in 1996: Barack and Michelle Obama. Alongside these are mathematicians, scientists, economists, writers and artists. You also gave us tender collections with your books: couples, mothers and sons, fathers and daughters. Even everyday objects, including stone walls and the relocated boulders of glacial erratics, have become true subjects magically transformed with the grace of your gaze. The aperture you use to catch the world has also caught our hearts to love the world more.

James Frost Parker, business leader, philanthropist, and longtime friend of the College, you graduated from Kenyon in 1981 and received your M.B.A. from the University of Chicago. You went on to become the owner and president of Parker Plastics Inc., manufacturing custom plastic packaging solutions.

As an avid and committed member of the men's swimming team, you thrived under the leadership of head coach Jim Steen. When you won the Burch Rowe Award, Coach Steen extolled your "enthusiasm, loyalty and passion (which) has resulted in a windfall of benefits, goodwill and collegiality over the years." Coach Steen further lauded your contributions, saying, "more than any swimmer I've ever coached, (he) gave meaning to the message. Having the ear of the team — not to mention the spirit — he communicated loud and clear ... simply by buying into everything we were trying to accomplish."

In 2006 you joined the Kenyon College Board of Trustees, serving for four years. You then returned to the board in 2013, spending ten additional years helping steer the ship, including as tri-chair of the Our Path Forward campaign and a member of the Kenyon in the World Committee. You have done much to make Kenyon a financial possibility for worthy students, including one who relates, "profits through the bear-shaped honey bottles ... fund a scholarship that helped me attend Kenyon," noting gratefully that your "generous gift made a big difference in my life." For that same enthusiasm, loyalty and passion you have always shown for Kenyon, we are honored to celebrate you today.

The George Gund Award

Established by the late Mr. Gund of Cleveland, a Kenyon trustee and parent; given annually for the best essays on topics that illuminate the nature of American life, culture or principles of government.

Maud Karambis, Class of 2027 for an essay reflecting on the Founding at its 250th anniversary.

The George B. Ogden Award

A cash award given by Thomas J. Goddard, Class of 1903, in honor of his friend George B. Ogden; awarded annually to the student who submits in competition the best essay in English prose.

Lillie Waltz, Class of 2029 for "Water Stronger Than Rock"

The Academy of American Poetry Prize

A cash prize, to be awarded annually, is presented to a student for the best poem or group of poems submitted in competition.

Jupiter Nesky, Class of 2028, for "Kiddush Levana"

The Muriel C. Bradbrook Prize

The gift of Professor Bradbrook, a distinguished visitor to the Department of English from Cambridge University; awarded annually to the student who submits in competition the best original short story or other specimen of prose fiction.

Teodor Lorne Jaworski for "The Doorman"

The Propper Prize for Poetry

Given by friends in memory of James M. Propper, Class of 1951; awarded to the first-year student or sophomore whose poem or group of poems, submitted in competition, is judged best by the Poetry Prize Committee.

Poppy Magee, Class of 2028 for "Eve, After the Fall"

The John Crowe Ransom Poetry Prize

Established in 1968 by the College in honor of the late Carnegie Professor of Poetry; a copy of Ransom's "Selected Poems" awarded to the junior or senior whose poem or group of poems, submitted in competition, is judged best by the Poetry Prize Committee.

Charlie Badger Brandt for "Little Geometries"

The Barbara H. Reitsma Award of the Math and Science Skills Center

Established in 2020 to honor Barbara Reitsma, the center's late former director, and to recognize a senior tutor in the center who embodies her legacy of compassion and dedication.

The Martin Luther King Jr. Humanitarian Award

This award is presented annually to the student organization and/or individual student that/who has best promoted social justice through service activities and programs as exemplified by the life and work of Martin Luther King Jr.

The Doris B. Crozier Award

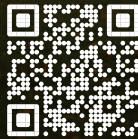
