## History Major Field WOMEN, GENDER AND SEXUALITY

## Description of the Field

The three analytical categories of women, gender and sexuality represent distinct trajectories in this field of History. Yet all have been informed by advancements made in feminist studies, poststructuralism and queer theory, and all three remain in conversation with one another regarding the social, political and discursive construction of the human body and sexual difference. This field aims to historicize the categories of "woman" and "man" alongside categories of sexual orientation and the variable forms of feminine, masculine, and gender nonconforming peoples that have existed throughout the pre-modern and modern periods. From the Americas to Asia, Africa, and Europe, this field applies a cross-cultural comparative approach to understand historical and geographical differences in the understandings of what constitutes sex, sexuality and gender. Thus, students studying this field will learn to recognize how perceived sex differences have appeared over time as seemingly natural and fundamental. They will learn to explain the persistent inequality between men and women and the repression of sexual diversity. In doing so, they will question how the idea of an alleged "natural relationship" between male and female and heterosexual sexual relations have structured and legitimized hierarchical relationships of power between men and women, the Global North and South, and between empire and periphery.
