Joel P. Brereton, Class of 1970

Joel Peter Brereton, scholar, translator, professor, we of the Kenyon community come together to honor you today. You left this hallowed Hill in 1970, venturing to Connecticut where you received both your master's degree and Ph.D. from Yale University before beginning a distinguished career in academia. Now professor emeritus of Asian studies at the University of Texas at Austin, you devoted your career to your students and to the preservation of ancient texts.

Along with your colleague, UCLA professor Stephanie Jamison, you took on the monumental task of translating the Rigveda, one of the four canonical sacred texts of Hinduism, from the original Sanskrit into English, including with your translation an insightful commentary. One reviewer stated, "One might be expected to characterize in these pages a new, complete translation of the Rigveda as 'precise,' 'careful,' 'philologically sound,' perhaps even 'illuminating' ... but the adjectives that come first to mind are of a different order entirely: elegant, charming, surprising, generous, readable, accessible, and engaging. An elegant RV is almost an oxymoron; thus, the achievement, in this case, is remarkable." Your erudition and hard work have produced a volume that is recognized across the discipline and has earned a place as the standard translation for years to come.

Your dedication to the history, preservation, and understanding of texts like the Rigveda is a testament to the lessons you learned while studying religion at Kenyon. Your career epitomizes the fruits of a liberal arts education, and we are delighted to call you our alumnus.

Doctor of Science

Stephanie A Fryberg, Class of 1994

Professor Stephanie A Fryberg, you are honored today for your work on cultural representations of minority individuals. After graduating from Kenyon in 1994 (summa cum laude and highest honors in psychology), you earned both a master's degree and Ph.D. in social psychology from Stanford University. You are currently the James Johnson Professor of Psychology at Northwestern University. Your work bridges cultural and social psychology as well as Indigenous studies. You describe yourself as a proud member of the Tulalip Tribes.

You have numerous publications and presentations, including many that reach out to popular audiences. You have mentored multiple graduate students, most from under-represented groups. Throughout your academic career, you have joined with others to create cultural change.

You have testified before Congress with respect to your early work on the influence of American Indian mascots. In later work you helped transform entire school systems

by promoting cultural inclusion and a growth-mindset approach to learning.

In a recent policy paper, you wrote about Native American omission in American culture and how it fuels discrimination and societal disparities, you remind us that rather than being "people of the past" as societal representations often imply, native peoples continue to strive

As a result of your work, 12 states have passed bills to require the teaching of native history in K-12 schools, and there exist native-led production teams that have created TV shows centered on native characters.

Your work has been recognized with numerous awards, including your recent election to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and an award of Distinguished Service from the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues (SPSSI) for which you have served as president. Kenyon is honored to recognize you today.

Robert Walter Goldman, Class of 1963

Robert Walter Goldman, business leader, philanthropist, long-time friend of the College, you graduated from Kenyon in 1963 after four full years on the Merit List. You went on to receive your M.B.A. from the University of Chicago and pursued a distinguished career focused on finance and operations. After your retirement in 2002 as the chief financial officer of Conoco Inc., you deployed your considerable knowledge of finance to benefit Kenyon and other nonprofit organizations.

In 2007, you joined the Kenyon College Board of Trustees and served for seven years. During that time, you chaired the budget and finance committee, where you focused on enhancing the rigor of Kenyon's budget strategy. You have long sought to improve student housing at Kenyon, believing that better housing will help continue to attract excellent students. You led the philanthropic charge to revitalize the village, which included creating new spaces for retail and for student apartments in the heart of Gambier. Even before that, your support was vital to the construction of the North Campus Apartments, an area beloved by our community.

But your service to your alma mater goes far beyond the philanthropic. You have served as a loyal Kenyon volunteer in many other capacities. You have consistently given of your time as a member of your reunion committees, as a career and admissions volunteer, and, perhaps most significantly, as a host for special events where you have connected a multitude of people to Kenyon. For all you have done for Kenyon and its people, we are honored to celebrate you today.
